Analysis	How do you interpret evidence to support your argument? Do you: Account for the source's point of view and/or argument Explain evidence using appropriate historical thinking concepts: O Historical Significance O Cause and/or Effect O Change and Continuity O Perspective O Relevance to contemporary or ethical issues Explicitly connect the interpretation of evidence to the thesis Corroborate and synthesize multiple pieces of evidence to support your argument
Clarity	<ul> <li>How clearly do you develop and communicate your argument?</li> <li>Does your writing: <ul> <li>Include introductions and conclusions beyond the restatement of prompt or thesis</li> <li>Show organization, that includes: <ul> <li>Thesis and topic sentences that guide organization</li> <li>Paragraphs organized into specific topics and are in a logical order to develop the argument</li> <li>Transitions that develop argument and flow</li> <li>Have clear discipline-specific language and is tone appropriate</li> <li>Demonstrate appropriate use of grammar and spelling</li> </ul> </li> </ul></li></ul>
