

## **Writing in History Guide**

Criteria	Description
Thesis and Argument  What is your argument?	<ul> <li>Situates the essay in its historical context</li> <li>Answers the inquiry question with a thesis statement that is historically defensible and supported by available evidence</li> <li>Develops the argument throughout paper</li> <li>Addresses conflicting evidence and/or counterargument</li> </ul>
Historical Evidence  Primary and Secondary Sources  How does evidence support an argument?	<ul> <li>Provides relevant, appropriate, and historically accurate evidence from a variety of sources</li> <li>Categorizes evidence</li> <li>Explains source(s) used as evidence</li> </ul>
Historical Thinking (Analysis)  How do you interpret evidence to support your historical argument?	<ul> <li>Accounts for the source's point of view and/or argument</li> <li>Effectively explains evidence using appropriate historical thinking skills:         <ul> <li>Historical Significance</li> <li>Cause and/or Effect</li> <li>Change and Continuity</li> <li>Perspective</li> <li>Relevance to Contemporary Issues/Ethical Evaluation</li> </ul> </li> <li>Explicitly connects the interpretation of evidence to the thesis</li> <li>Corroborates and synthesizes multiple pieces of evidence to support argument</li> </ul>
Clarity in Writing  How clearly do you develop and communicate your argument?	<ul> <li>Shows organization         <ul> <li>Thesis and topic sentences guide organization</li> <li>Paragraphs are organized into specific topics and are in a logical order to develop the argument</li> <li>Transitions to develop argument and flow</li> </ul> </li> <li>Uses clear discipline-specific language and tone appropriate for intended audience</li> <li>Demonstrates appropriate use of grammar and spelling</li> <li>Introduction and conclusion go beyond a restatement of prompt and thesis.</li> </ul>
